OCTOBER MINISTER'S LETTER

Each year, October marks the final stages of the harvest and the end of the warmer months. It heralds shorter days and darker nights as the signs of autumn abound. For many, the thought of cold, dark winter days creeping ever closer is a source of dread. However, autumn is commonly cited as a favourite season for lots of people who appreciate it for the spectacular display of colourful foliage we can enjoy at this time of year, along with the renewed possibilities of enjoying things like warm bowls of soup, hot



chocolates, cozy jumpers and roaring fires. Businesses certainly know how to cash in on this love of autumn by trying to tempt us with products like heated blankets and pumpkin spice lattés.

Between the dread of the foreboding winter months ahead and the delights of the autumn season, October is somewhat of a 'marmite' month with which we might have a love-hate relationship. This contrast is displayed most acutely right at the end of the month with a trilogy of festivals, Halloween on 31st October, All Saint's Day on 1st November and All Souls on 2nd November. Samhain, a pre-Christian festival which marked the end of the summer and the beginning of winter at the end of October, was seen as the threshold of the dark half of the year. After the Christian church established the feast of All Saints on 1st November, otherwise known as All Hallows Day (All Holy Ones), the day prior to it became known as All Hallows Eve, later contracted to Halloween.

Although All Hallows Eve was not originally associated with the dead, the later establishment of All Souls Day, on 2nd November, meant that the whole period of late October and early November took on a theme of light and dark: Halloween being an evening upon which the spirits of the dead were thought to be close, All Saints Day being a celebration of those who have gone before us as examples of living in the light of Christ, and All Souls being a time to remember and honour those who have departed this life.

As we journey through this season of greater darkness, take some time to consider ways in which you might be a source of light and warmth to others. This does not necessarily need to take the form of hot chocolates and warm bowls of soup, although those things are lovely. It might instead take the form of spending time with those whose loneliness or isolation is felt more keenly during the winter months, or reaching out to comfort those remembering loved ones departed. Whatever you choose to do, may you be a light for others this autumn.

October 2025 Prayers and Reflections for each week from Isaiah

Week 1: Strengthen the feeble hands, steady the knees that give way; say to those with fearful hearts, "Be strong, do not fear; your God will come". Isaiah 35: 3-4

Ponder: As we grow older, we sometimes feel our weakness, and it is easy to become fearful of both the present and the future. Isaiah reminds us that God is with us; he will give us his strength, and he will help us overcome our fears, so that we can live in peace.

Pray: Loving God, be with us as we age; give us your strength and help. May we know your loving presence to calm our fears and give us hope as we trust your goodness to us. Amen.

<u>Week 2</u>: Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not faint.

Isajah 40: 30-31

Ponder: Here, Isaiah reminds us that we all run out of steam sometimes, that we feel we cannot go on. When this happens, the answer is to hope in the Lord, to trust him to renew our strength, to trust him to give us the resources we need to carry on. Then, whatever the problems, we shall soar like eagles high above the earth, knowing God's help.

Pray: Gracious God, when we come to times of weakness, tiredness and wanting to give up, help us to turn and look to you, to hope in your goodness, to know your strength and to trust you for all that we need to go on. Renew and restore us Lord, that we may soar with wings like eagles, and know true freedom. Amen.

Week 3: But now, this is what the Lord says – he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you O Israel: fear not for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine. Isaiah 43: 1

Ponder: A reminder that God is our creator; he knows us by name; he reassures us that he has redeemed us and will never desert us; that we are precious to him, even in our frailty and weakness. We can trust him with our life.

Pray: Loving God, thank you for your love. May we know your comforting presence with us through good and bad times. May we rely on your redeeming strength and love. Amen.

Week 4: Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See I am doing a new thing! Isaiah 43: 18-19

Ponder: Human beings find change difficult, but sometimes we need to put aside what we have always done and look to see if God is wanting to do a new thing with us or in our church community. Let us open our spiritual eyes and see what God is doing this autumn.

Pray: Holy God, you are unchanging, but you challenge us to change and to see and do new things in your service. Open our hearts and minds to see the new things you want to bring to us. Amen.



Born 200 years ago Dr Peter Eade 1825 -1915

He grew up in Blofield and became an eminent physician in Norwich. Mayor of the city three times he was appointed magistrate at the age of 46 he remained one for 41 years! During his remarkable 90 years he kept diaries describing many events & changes in Blofield & in Norwich.

His autobiography is available at £10 with proceeds going to Blofield Church where he worshipped, he and his four sisters are buried, and where the fine east window is a memorial to him

- Apprenticed in Blofield to his father, also Peter Eade, the young Peter learned during five years of training about drugs, dispensing, bookkeeping and even some minor surgery.
- He moved from the practice in Blofield to a brilliant career in Norwich becoming physician at the Norfolk and Norwich hospital, having work published in the Lancet and receiving membership of the Royal College of Physicians. Living in a large house in Upper Giles Street he built up a practice and gained a number of eminent appointments in medicine.
- Blofield village school was built on land belonging to him near the Town Well and, seeing the need for school children to learn gardening, he provided land for the purpose.
- He was instrumental in the 1883 remodelling of the Norfolk and Norwich hospital in St Stephens Street, and in promoting many open spaces and parks like Chapel Field Gardens, Eaton Park and Mousehold Heath for the health and well being of city dwellers.
- He grew up in the village enjoying cricket, boating, fishing and outdoor country pursuits, was taught, initially, with his four older sisters, and became apprenticed to his father before completing training in medicine in London. Humorous tales are told of student life.
- He knew the church well with its 'tall' pews for some families and backless benches for others. A 'clarionet' gave the first note for hymns.
- There were stocks in the village for miscreants.
- At Michaelmas a fair on the Street had canvas-covered stalls and one or two roundabouts.

New Organ for Hemblington Church



On 9th September, we installed a new organ at Hemblington Church. Our previous "organ" was a very old digital piano, which was donated second-hand to the church many years ago. It has served us well but lately has been temperamental and spare parts are no longer available.

The new organ is a second-hand Allen's Protégé L9 digital pipe organ with two keyboards and a 32-note pedalboard. The organ was originally installed in St Gerard's Church in Bellshill, near Glasgow. St Gerard's closed in November 2024 after amalgamating with Sacred Heart in the same area.

The organ is now ten years old but comes with a further ten years warranty. Our organist, Rory Marsden, believes that this new organ will significantly enhance the music at services and hopefully, encourage us to hold more musical performances in the church.

We are planning a concert for early next year when we hope you will be able to join us to celebrate the arrival of our new organ. More details of this concert will be provided in a future issue of Blofield News.


